Britain's most talented chef, Gordon Ramsay (left), has at last found a setting to match his considerable gifts

considerable gifts. The art deco restaurant at Claridge's Hotel, Mayfair, has been given the Cinderella treatment by Thierry Despont, interior designer to Bill Gates and Hubert de Givenchy, among others. Meanwhile Ramsay maintains his original three-star restaurant in Chelsea as well as his spin-off Pétrus (named after the Pomérol wine) in St James's. In July 2001, Pétrus dished up the most expensive restaurant meal ever – £44,000 for a party of six, thanks largely to the volume of Pétrus drunk.

Robinson in *The Graduate*. Much of this production's appeal rests on the on-stage disrobing of Mrs Robinson, which has already afforded theatre-goers a fleeting, dimmed glimpse of a naked Kathleen Turner, Jerry Hall, Amanda Donohoe and Anne Archer. Gray, 60, is so

far the oldest incumbent. Coincidentally, Gray contributed to the 1967 film *The*

Tessa Kennedy, who has cornered and titivated a niche in grand English house design, has resurrected the Rivoli Bar at the Ritz Hotel. Gone are the tired Pringle boutiques that marred the Ritz's arcaded frontage, replaced by an updated version of the original art deco Rivoli Bar. There's fibreoptic lighting, a domed gold-leaf ceiling, an Italian-marble bar, golden bamboo flooring and walls veneered in rare camphor wood with inset Lalique panels. Drinks and nibbles are served from noon to 11.30pm, with a brasserie-style menu.
